IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

[Cliffwood/Cliffwood Beach] has Levels of Total Trihalomethanes (TTHM) Above the Drinking Water Standard

Our water system recently violated the drinking water standard or maximum contaminant level (MCL) for TTHM from 10/01/2025 to 12/31/2025. We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we are doing to correct this situation

The standard for TTHM is 80 micrograms per liter ($\mu\text{g/L}$). It is determined by averaging all the samples collected at each sampling location for the past 12 months (a locational running annual average (LRAA)). The LRAA level(s) of TTHM at 1 of sampling locations exceeded the standard:

What should I do?

- There is nothing you need to do. You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. If a situation arises where the water is no longer safe to drink, you will be notified within 24 hours.
- If you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant, are pregnant, or are elderly, you may be at increased risk and should seek advice from your health care providers about drinking this water.

What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been an emergency, you would have been notified within 24 hours. TTHM are four volatile organic chemicals all of which form when disinfectants react with natural organic matter in the water. This is commonly known as a disinfection by-product (DBP).

**People who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the standard or MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. **

- **What is being done?** The Township began flushing of water mains monthly since the week of July 21, 2025, to minimize formation of TTHMs while ensuring we maintain an adequate level of disinfectant. The Township is also exploring other measures to remediate the situation like inspecting the water tank.
 - This has been ongoing for six months. You were previously notified of the TTHM MCL violation in public notice(s) issued on: 08/08/2025 and 11/25/2025
 - Although the LRAA for TTHM has exceeded the MCL, the results for the current quarter are 55.1 $\mu\text{g/L}$, which are below the MCL of 80 $\mu\text{g/L}$.
